> Mulock Picnic at Woodbridge Saturday, August 22nd.

Infuse six heaping teaspoons of Salada Black Tea in a pint of fresh bolling water. After six minutes strain liquid into two-quart container. While hot, add 11/2 cups of granulated sugar and the juice of 2 lemons. Stir well until sugar is dissolved; fill container with cold water. Do not allow tea to cool before adding the cold water; otherwise liquid will become cloudy. Serve with chipped Ice.
