OFFICES IN PRINCIPAL ONTARIO CITIES

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—On Friday of this week the government celebrates its first anniversary of office. It is interesting to see how many election pledges have been redeemed, how many still await action.

It promised a national commission to deal with unemployment: this has been set up and has made some constructive suggestions to the cabinet, as well as conducting a census of national unemployment.

A National system of unemployment insurance is another pledge. This has not moved since the election. The matter is before the Privy

The government is to balance the budget. Again, minor progress has been made, but there is a long distance to travel yet. The drought made it harder, for this year.
