The attention of those whom it may concern is directed to the following: The Municipal Act, Section 56, Sub-section 3b— "Every person of the full age of twenty-one years and a British subject by birth or naturalization, and not disqualified under this Act or by law from voting, who has paid in full an income tax of not less than \$15.00, under the provisions of the Income Tax Act of Ontario, 1936, within the twelve months next preceding the last day for making complaint to the judge under the Voters' List Act, shall be entitled to vote at a municipal election in the Municipality in which he resides, either in respect to his place of residence or place of business therein, and to obtain a certificate entitling him to so vote upon producing to the clerk of the municipality at any time within thirty days prior to the day of voting for such election the official receipt evidencing payment of the said income tax."
