New Hydro rates will be put into effect at this December billing. The new rates are: domestic 3.3c. per K.W.H. for the first 60 hours and 1.2c. for additional consumption, minimum monthly bill of 83c.; commercial 5c. per 100 watt service charge plus 2.6c. for first 100 hours use plus .08c. for all additional consumption with minimum bill of 83c.; power \$1.00 H.P. with a consumption charge of 1.8c. per K.W.H. for first 50 hours use of connected load, plus 1.1c. for second 50 hours use and balance at 0.33c. per K.W.H. This will mean a substantial saving to hydro consumers in Woodbridge. The service charge for domestic consumers has been eliminated.
