Hill expressed their willingness to stand for re-election but so far no one outside the council has declared their intentions of running, but it is considered likely that Christian Nelson, who made an excellent run last year, will be a candidate for the seat vacated if councillor McLean seeks the higher office of Reeve. Ex-councillor W. Neal who unsuccessfully contested the reeveship last year is also mentioned a a possible council aspirant and before the official nomination day which will be Monday, December 28 several others may enter the race.
