### A FAVORITE TESTED RECIPE

Pecan Drop Cookies 3 tablespoons butter, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 egg, well beaten, 1 cup pastry flour, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3/4 cup pecans chopped fine, 3 tablespoons milk.

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly, add egg and milk and beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients and nuts. Beat well. Drop with teaspoon on buttered tin and bake in moderate oven (300) until slightly browned.
