A FAVORITE TESTED RECIPE Orange and Cabbage Salad

2 cups finely shredded cabbage, 1 cup chopped celery, 1 orange, cut fine, 1/2 cup shredded blanched almonds, 1/4 cup chopped green pepper, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/4 cup cream, whipped.

YORK HOLSTEIN PRODUCTION LEADERS

Canadian Holstein Friesian Cows in the December list of R.O.P. producers as reported by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, number 354, in the sixteen various age-classifications. The average production of the eight class leaders in the 365 day division was 19,222 lbs. milk, 699.8 lbs. fat, while in the eight 305 day classes the leaders including as above two and three-year-old heifers, averaged 14,786 lbs. milk, 534.7 lbs. fat.

York County herds produced four of the sixteen class leaders in this Dominion-wide list. Hazel Alcartra Posch in the herd of R. S. McKinnon, Maple, was the high three-year-old for Canada in the twice-a-day milking, 365 day division, with 18,362 lbs. milk, 613 lbs. fat; while the 7-year-old leader for heifers milked twice daily was Lonelm Rag Apple Cleopatra, owned in the herd of Geo. C. Jackson, Downsview, her year production being 15,518 lbs. of 4.05% milk, giving her a total of 628 lbs. fat. The third York County leader was Darkie Tensen Wayne from the herd of Louis Kelly, Schomberg, with a 305 day production of 13,778 lbs. milk, 484 lbs. fat; and the fourth Llenroc Bess Burke Lass, two-year-old from the herd of Rankin C. Kellam, Weston, with a 305 day production of 13,041 lbs. milk, 468 lbs. fat.

ANNUAL MEETING, YORK HOLSTEIN CLUB

In view of the very keen interest being taken by cattle owners at the present time in the results of feeding mineral mixtures, bone meal, etc. to cattle, the York County Holstein Breeders' Club has arranged to have Prof. Geo. E. Raithby of the Ontario Agricultural College speak on this subject at the annual meeting of the club to be held at Richmond Hill on Monday afternoon next, Feb. 1st.

Prof. Raithby has been directing some interesting experiments of considerable value to dairymen and he will explain the results he and others have obtained in raising the butter fat test of low testing cows and herds as well as other problems in the feeding of dairy cattle.

The meeting which is called for 1.30 is open to all dairy men, whether owners of grade or pure bred cattle. President Harold Boake of Downsview and Secretary Frank Ramsay of Sharon are making plans to accommodate a good turn-out in the Municipal Hall.
