## WAY BACK IN LIBERAL FILES

FORTY YEARS AGO  
From our Issue of April 8th, 1897  
The following directors were present at the meeting of the Richmond Hill and Yonge Street Agricultural Society yesterday: W. H. Clubine, T. Lloyd, I. Crosby, J. H. Sanderson, J. Palmer, P. G. Savage, T. F. McMahon, J. T. McElroy, T. H. Trench, J. Slater, G. Leek, D. C. Steele, R. Elliott, D. Lynett, P. Boynton, J. N. Boyle, G. Dibb, C. Norman, W. H. Pugsley, H. A. Nicholls. Reports were received from the concert committee and several of the collecting committees. It was decided by resolution to send \$2.00 to the Wheelmen's Association so as to have the bicycle races under the rules of said association. The prize list as revised by the Executive Committee was adopted after one or two alterations. The prize for senior football team was raised from \$15 to \$16.50. In addition to the usual sports prizes this year will be given for Running Jump, Standing Jump, Run Hop Step and Jump and Sack Race. Before adjourning a committee was appointed to engage a band, and another committee to rent booths to those who require them.  
Inspector Hodgson paid his annual visit of inspection to the High School on Tuesday last. He seemed well pleased with the organization of the classes and commented very favorably on the work being done in the school. He said he noticed one thing which he had never before seen so marked

in this school. It was that the spirit of the pupils and teachers was good and betokened good results. After school he met the Board and talked with them about their plans for rebuilding.

The Village Council met on April 6th, 1897, present, the Reeve, Councillors Innes, Palmer and Sanderson. The minutes of 19th March were read and approved. The following accounts read: Joseph Hall, account of oil for street lamps \$10.65; T. F. McMahon, printing and advertising \$18.50; England Mason, for Band at Rink for season, \$22.00; Arthur Coombs, 15 loads of sand for Rink, \$9.00; James Brownlee, self and man attending Rink, \$18.00. Moved by Mr. Sanderson, seconded by Mr. Innes that the treasurer do pay the foregoing accounts.—Carried.

## THIRTY YEARS AGO

From our Issue of April 4th, 1907  
At a curling meeting held Thursday evening it was decided that neither the Smith medal nor the Slater trophy has been won by any rink during the past season. These trophies will, therefore, be held by the President, Mr. C. P. Wiley, till next season.

The house of Mr. H. R. Heise, near Victoria Square, was struck by lightning Tuesday evening of last week, about 10.20. Considerable damage was done, but fortunately the house did not take fire, and no person was seriously injured. The bolt came down the east chimney, splintered the rafters, blew out the east garret windows, and pierced the brick fireplace. Part of the charge went down through the coal stove near the centre of the building, tore the oil cloth under the stove, splintered the door frame in the cellar, and blew out two lamps in different rooms. Mrs. Heise who had her hand on the stove pipe at the time received quite a shock.


