Funeral of the late James McLean Held on Monday

The funeral of the late James Mc-Lean who passed away on Friday, June 18th after an illness of four weeks was held Monday afternoon and was very largely attended. It was probably the largest funeral ever held in this district and the hundreds who gathered to pay their last respects to an outstanding citizen were representative of all walks of life and many came from distant points throughout the province. Members of the Plowmen's Association from all sections of Ontario, members of the Masonic Order, men who had been associated with the deceased in his many activities, government officials, and hundreds of friends crowded the Richmond Hill United Church where the public service was held following the private service at his late residence on Roseview Avenue. The service was conducted by Rev.

C. W. Follett, pastor of the church and assisting him was Rev. G. W. Back of St. George's United Church, Toronto, a close personal friend of the McLean family. The service opened with the singing of "Unto the Hills Around do I Lift Up My Longing Eyes" an old favorite of Mr. McLean. Scripture reading and prayer by Rev. C. W. Follett was followed by a vocal solo "The Stranger of Galilee" rendered impressively by Mrs. Lester Jones. The sermon was given by Rev. G. W. Back who said that he had known Mr. McLean for the past thirty-seven years. Paying glowing tribute to the life of the late James McLean he said, "he lived all his life in this community and his life was an open book. And while we sorrow to-day at our loss and sympathize with the family we must not think of sorrow as the last word.
