Miscellaneous purchases at stores, 25 per cent.

Transportation, 20 per cent.

Hotels and other lodgings, 20 per cent.

Restaurants and other eating houses, 21 per cent.

Amusements 8 per cent.

Confectionery, 6 per cent.

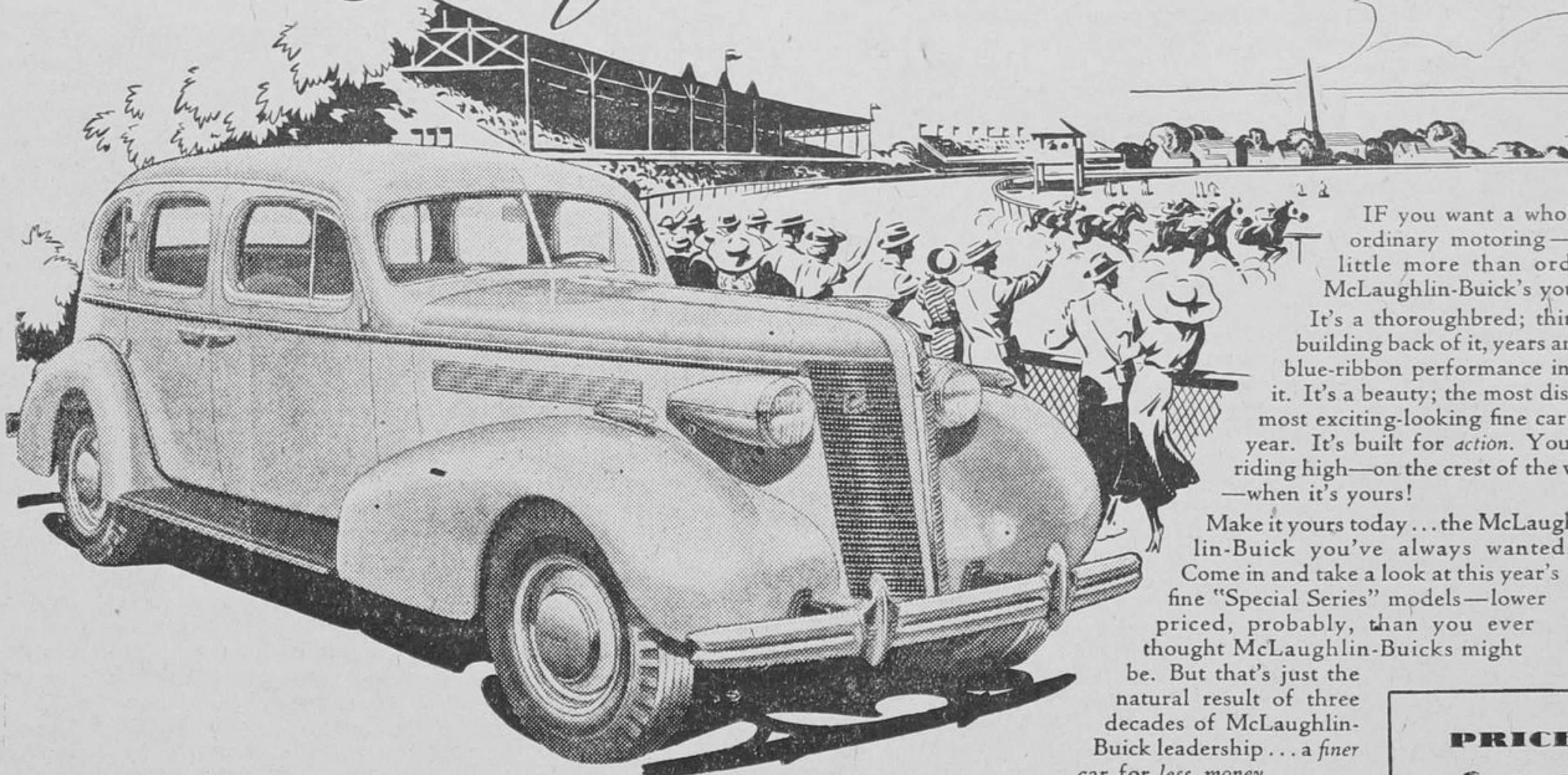
The widespread benefits bestowed by these imported spenders, the tourists, are impressively significant.
