Recently "Motor Magazine" has made a careful survey of the channels through which this much coveted dollar passes. Here it is:

Miscellaneous purchases at stores,

25 per cent.

Transportation, 20 per cent. Hotels and other lodgings, 20 per cent.

Restaurants and other eating houses, 21 per cent.

Amusements 8 per cent.

Confectionery, 6 per cent.

The widespread benefits bestowed by these imported spenders, the tourists, are impressively significant. Scarcely any interest in the lucky tourist community that does not share the benefits brought by tourist expenditures. The fact that 66 cents of every dollar finds access to the tills of local merchants, the hotels and the restaurants, should impress the obligation these various classes of business owe in encouraging and fostering the tourist trade.
