A ten-day program of arts and erafts, games, music and folk dancing was concluded last week at the Loyal True Blue and Orange Home Mr. C. J. Kerswill, M.A., has been when a special program of games and recreation was held in the garden of the home.

Last week's program was attended by Rev. Gilbert Agar, Executive Director of the Council and officials of the Loyal Orange Lodge. The guests were received by Mrs. L. Crockett, matron of the home.

Main object of the recreational school was to initiate a planned summer playground program that will be extended into the year round recreational activities of the 100-odd children now in residence at the home.

Under the terms of the will of the late R. W. Leonard funds have been contributed toward the maintenance and work of the home. Play equipment provided included tethertennis, outdoor basket ball, volleyball, roller skates, swings, quoits and croquet, and recently all these playthings were being tried out by the children. The gift, under the terms of the will, also provides for a large number of trees and shrubs for the grounds surrounding the home. These are in the process of being planted.

The Community Welfare Council of Ontario has provided the leadership in the recreational-school, Miss Jessie Stewart teaching arts and crafts; Miss Elda Thompson games, music and folk dancing and Miss Dorothy Cross dramatics and storytelling. The program was planned and carried out with the assistance of Mrs. L. Crockett, Mr. E. Abbot and various members of the staff of the home.

The activities of the pre-school and primary children include singing, games, stories, sand projects, plasticine and peg boards. The older children have enjoyed making leather purses and belts, reed and raffia baskets and mats. Group singing, organized games, play parties and folk dancing form a large part of the intensive programme. Dramatics, story-telling and story-acting will be stressed in the later activities.
