Abbot Hunter Blair Traces Relationship London, July 12.—King George of England and his Queen are cousins, is the interesting disclosure made by Abbot Hunter Blair, O.S.B., noted antiquarian.

They are seventeenth cousins, it is true, but cousins just the same. King George, says the Abbot, descends in right line through Mary Queen of Scots, James VI. and I. and the Guelphs, from Robert III., King of Scots (1315-1390).

Robert's sister, Jean, was married in 1376 to Sir John Lyon of Glamis, whose grandson was created Lord Glamis, in 1445, the direct ancestor of Lady Elizabeth Angela Marguerite Lyon, who is now Queen Elizabeth.
