Board of Health Urges No Let Up in Precautionary Measures

At a special session of the Board of Health this morning it was decided to postpone the opening of schools until October 4th. No new cases have developed in the village but developments in the immediate district are such that the M.O.H. and members of the Board deemed it most important that all precautions be strictly maintained for at least another week. The public library is closed to all under 21 years of age. The order closing schools until October 4th also applies to Sunday Schools and playgrounds and co-operation of all citizens is asked in keeping children off the streets and in their own yards. Attendance at public gatherings is to be discouraged as much as possible. The Board of Health wishes it to be understood that the danger period is by no means passed and the strictest precautions on the part of young and old is urged to prevent a spread of the dread epidemic.
