

Richmond Hill Schools To Open Monday, Oct. 4th

Richmond Hill High and Public School students will return to school after enjoying over three months holidays Monday morning at 9 a.m. At a special meeting of the Board of Health this morning it was decided to permit the opening of the schools, and it was felt that the threat of infantile paralysis had definitely subsided. No new cases have been reported in the district for some weeks. City of Toronto schools will not open until October 11th it was announced this morning.

Suggestions for Local Students

The parents of Richmond Hill Public School pupils will undoubtedly realize that the unfortunate but unavoidable closing of school during the month of September is liable to cause serious results next June unless some measures are taken to overcome the setback which has occurred. As a first step in this connection I am publishing a list of books which will be required by the pupils of the various grades. It will expedite matters considerably if all students insofar as possible come fully equipped with the necessary supplies, on Monday next, the opening day of school.

To the many parents who have co-operated in the past we desire to express our thanks and invite you once again to lend aid whenever possible. This can be accomplished by the usual means, namely,—good attendance and home supervision. Furthermore I think you will be interested to learn that the new Course of Study just recently issued by the Department of Education specially stresses English and calls for at least twenty books to be read during the school year by each pupil in first, second and third classes. It will be necessary for some of this reading to be done at home and arrangements will be made to loan all available books from the school library. Further supplies may be had from the Public Library. We shall be grateful if parents will supervise this home-reading and supply certificates re the same when called for. The text books required are as follows:—

- ROOM 1
Sr. IV Class—Arithmetic, Composition and Grammar, Geography, Health Book, Canadian Speller Book 2 (Gage & Co.). Reader in Canadian Civics (MacMillan & Co.), and Life Literature Series Book 2 (Thos. Nelson & Co.) as well as several note books etc.
- Jr. IV Class—Same as above excepting last book which should be Life Literature Series Book 1.
- If by any chance school should not open on Monday next pupils should review as much as possible the work of the preceding year.

Jr. III—Reader, Book 5; Speller, Book One; Geography; Junior History of England; Health Book; Composition and Grammar; Work Book and pencil; 4 ink books.

Jr. II—Junior Arithmetic, Grades III and IV (if obtainable); Second Reader; New Canadian Speller, Book 1; Drawing Book (small); Four ink books with lines, and one work book. (Please do not purchase crayons or pen).

ROOM 6

Sr. I—First Book Reader; New Canadian Speller, Book 1; Drawing Book (small).

ROOM 7

Beginners—"Mary, John and Peter" primer; Work book, not too thick, with lines; soft pencil; rubber; ruler (12"); small drawing book; crayons (8 colours).

Four Candidates Seek Election In North York

Returns Will Be Announced By Loud Speaker at The Liberal Office

Four candidates were nominated to contest the provincial election in North York at the nomination meeting at Newmarket Wednesday afternoon. In addition to Morgan Baker the present member who is the Liberal candidate supporting Hon. Mitchell F. Hepburn there is a candidate representing Hon. Earl Rowe, a C.C.F. aspirant and a last minute entry Stanley Cleverly of North York Twp. who is running as a Socialist-Labor candidate. Voting is next Wednesday, October 6th and the polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Returns of the election will be broadcast over all Toronto radio stations and these may be heard over a special loud speaker which will be installed outside The Liberal Office Wednesday evening. In addition to the radio returns from all parts of Ontario detailed results of the voting in North York and neighbouring ridings will be announced as quickly as they can be secured from the various sub-divisions of the constituency.

Warden MacDonald Supports Hepburn

Praises Him as Real Friend of Labor But Enemy of Reds

"It's the same old firm, Henry & Company, bankrupt, with a new name Rowe & Company," declared Reeve W. Edward MacDonald, Warden of York County describing the Provincial opposition in an address delivered this week.

Once a Conservative Party supporter, the Warden praised Premier Hepburn. "I am proud to give him my allegiance," the speaker said. "Mr. Hepburn undoubtedly has made mistakes, but they were honest ones, and he has been big enough to rectify them, and bold enough to let principles stand first with him."
The Premier was never anything but sympathetic to organized labor, "but he has no use for labor's worst enemy, the seat of all its troubles—the Red element," he added.

Hepburn Speaks In Massey Hall Saturday Night

Toronto's historic Massey Hall, where many political battles have been fought, will be the scene where Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn will fire his final shots in the Ontario election campaign. The Toronto Central Liberal Association has organized a gigantic public rally in honor of Premier Hepburn this Saturday night, October 2, when final rebuttal to his opponents and an announcement of provincial-wide significance will be made by the premier.

Premier Hepburn's address, starting at 10 p.m. will be broadcast over a wide provincial network of radio stations.

Flanking the premier on either side on the platform will be seven Liberal candidates who are running in Toronto and York. Massey Hall has been elaborately decorated for the big political meeting, and Toronto Liberals predicted today that not only would every seat in the hall be occupied, but hundreds will have to listen to the proceedings outside the building. Loud-speakers are to be installed for their benefit.

Only other two speakers during Saturday night's meeting will be Arthur G. Slaght, K.C., M.P. (Parry Sound), and Mrs. Daniel Strachan, mother of Ian Strachan, who is a candidate in St. George riding. Mrs. Strachan is a former president of the Toronto Women's Liberal Association, and will speak in behalf of the Liberal women of Ontario. Mr. Slaght, who will introduce Mr. Hepburn, will speak for 20 minutes.

Sharp at 10 p.m. Ontario's premier will go out on a provincial network that includes 15 radio stations which occupy an hour. Radio authorities state that the Prime Minister's address will have as extensive a hook-up as ever before attempted in Ontario. Engineers are already at work checking and testing lines to make certain that transmission will be perfect.

It is estimated that Premier Hepburn's audience, in Massey Hall and in their own homes listening to his voice over the radio, will be by far the largest audience reached by any one speaker in the present election.
