**HEPBURN AND
TIMBER POLICY**

Has Saved Newsprint Industry For the Province of Ontario

Premier Hepburn gave a clear and sane defence of his Northern Ontario timber policy when speaking recently at Lindsay. "Pulpwood," he said, "like cattle or wheat reaches maturity and should be harvested then. Otherwise it goes to waste. That is why we are cutting timber at the proper stage and at the same time providing work for people in the north and revenue for the province. By doing this, besides providing revenue for the province and employment for people in the north we are creating a demand in the north for supplies from the south. Coupled with this should be a far-sighted policy of reforestation to assure a perpetual supply for mills. This is the plan the government is carrying out. When this government took office whole communities in the north were on relief and that section of the province presented a sorry picture of stagnation and privation. Newsprint mills of the Northern United States were rapidly moving south to southern pine. Had this movement continued the main market for northern timber would have been lost and the newsprint industry of Ontario might have disappeared. Under these circumstances we authorized for the time being export of pulpwood for these mills. We also reclaimed for the people timber empires which had been given to friends of Tory governments and which were being held by them for speculation. By this policy we put 25,000 more men to work in woods operations and turned a deficit in the lands and forests department into revenue of \$4,000,000. Next year we anticipate there will be 50,000 men at work in the bush and that the provincial timber revenue will reach \$7,000,000."

**WAY BACK IN
LIBERAL FILES**

FORTY YEARS AGO

From our Issue of Sept. 30th, 1897
Commissioners Arthur Quantz and Andrew Miller met on Saturday at 4 o'clock to receive tenders for the building of a new bridge in the Pomona Road, directly opposite the Queen's hotel, Thornhill. The contract was given to Mr. Robert Clark for \$29.00. The tenders ran as high as \$92.00.

A petition is in circulation in Markham Village asking the Council to take over the Public Library and make it a free library. The Sun thinks that a Village grant of \$75 a year will be sufficient for running expenses, and that nothing more will be required as the Ontario Government practically buys all the books for the library. If Markham shows as much economy as Richmond Hill does, the Sun is quite within the mark. Our village grant is \$75, the library and reading room are open three nights a week, and we purchase every year \$100 worth of new books for the library, and magazines, periodicals and newspapers to the amount of \$50.00.

The erection of the new bell which was placed in position in the belfry on the Public School building on Friday afternoon, created quite an excitement, as many of our citizens scarcely knew how a 700 lb. bell would be raised to such a height. The trick was easily accomplished, however, and the metallic vessel went up without a hitch. The new bell which will be used for village purposes as well as for the Public School, was manufactured by the McShane Company of Baltimore, Md. Its tone is B. flat, and when it was rung for the first time on Friday evening at six o'clock the verdict was that its tone was loud, clear and musical.

**A MAN HONORED
IN HIS OWN COUNTRY**

Fellow citizens of Gwillimbury Township, who know Earl Rowe best, are enthusiastic admirers of his sterling character and gift for leadership

If you had a large scale map of Ontario, you would find Gwillimbury Township marked in the County of Simcoe. But you would have to possess a very large scale map indeed, to locate the town of Newton Robinson.

This little dot of a town is beginning to find itself in print frequently these days. The citizens feel that this is only to be expected because one of their own boys, Earl Rowe, is going to be, they are confident, Premier-Elect of Ontario the night of October 6th.

Some of the old-time proverbs are wearing a little thin these modern days and that well-known one—"A prophet is not without honor save in his own country" means nothing, simply nothing, to these sturdy citizens of Gwillimbury. They honor Earl Rowe because they know and admire him; the oldsters have been watching him for twenty-two years, ever since he was elected a Township Councillor on his 21st birthday.

Reaches Cabinet Rank
They start them young in public service in these Ontario towns but only one in ten thousand forges ahead to the Provincial Legislature—only one in a hundred thousand keeps going until he reaches Cabinet rank at Ottawa. Such a man is Earl Rowe—and Gwillimbury Township has followed, with pride, every step of his progress.

The most important events in this young man's twenty-two years of public service can be briefly summarized:

- 1915—Elected to Council of Gwillimbury Township
- 1916—Elected Reeve—re-elected each year for five years.
- 1923—Elected to Ontario Legislature.
- 1925—Elected to Federal Parliament.
- 1930—Re-elected.
- 1935—Promoted to the Cabinet by Honourable R. B. Bennett, then Prime Minister. Re-elected to Federal Parliament.

1936—Unanimously selected as leader of the Ontario Liberal-Conservative Party.

A Happy Family

Earl Rowe, whenever his public duties will permit, hurries back to Newton Robinson. For there he finds awaiting him his sturdy red brick house—his wife and three fine children—his 225 acres of farm land—his pure-bred Yorkshire swine, Durham cattle, registered Clydesdales—his old Township friends.

One cannot hope to understand a public man solely by observing him in the midst of public affairs in Toronto or Ottawa. Follow Earl Rowe back to Newton Robinson—have a meal with him in his big kitchen—walk with him over his fertile acres—see him feeding his swine and his cattle—talk with his aged parents, who live across the road. Then you would realize even more fully than ever before how completely this man possesses that something without which all else is so much chaff—and that something is CHARACTER.

Heredity must get some of the credit. The Conservative leader comes from old British stock which settled in Simcoe County many, many years ago. His father, still active at 88 and his mother, eight years younger, were farm folk, and Earl Rowe, when little more than a youngster, bought his farm from his father on credit and paid every cent of his debt from his profits as a dirt farmer.

Virtues of the Soil

On his typical Ontario farm—in his typical rural Ontario residence—Earl Rowe leads the regular routine of a farmer when call him to the cities. His is a friendly home—made happy by the presence of his wife, and his children, Jean aged 17, Bill aged 13 and Lennox aged 8. Here are enshrined the homely virtues of the soil—those virtues which since earliest days have given strength of character to so many of Canada's greatest public servants
