Late Mrs. William Sommerville
Mrs. William Sommerville one of Markham township's best known residents and a daughter of one of its early pioneers, died here Thursday, October 7th after a prolonged illness. She would have been 84 Friday.

Mrs. Sommerville was born in this vicinity, on a farm at Hagerman's Hill. She passed the greater part of her life here except for a few years spent in Michigan where she went after her marriage in 1878, returning to Canada on the death of her husband to live with her brother on the old homestead. In 1919 she moved to Unionville.

She was especially well known for her musical ability. Before her marriage she was the organist at St. Andrew's Presbyterian church and up to the time of her death continued her interest in singing and singers. She is survived by one daughter, Mina, and two sisters, Mrs. Andrew Boa of Montreal, and Mrs. G. A. M. Davison of Unionville.

The funeral was held on Saturday from the home with interment in St. Andrew's cemetery. The service was conducted by Rev. W. H. Fuller and was largely attended.

Official Count Gives G. Henry 209 Majority

Hon. George S. Henry, Conservative candidate in York East riding, was elected by a majority of 209 votes over his Liberal opponent, H. J. McConnell, according to official figures issued Wednesday by Lyman Kennedy, R.O.

Unofficial figures furnished by scrutineers of Mr. Henry on the night of the election gave Mr. Henry a majority of 239 and H. J. McConnell had refused to concede the election until official figures were announced by the returning officer.

Checks made by representatives of both Mr. Henry and Mr. McConnell varied little from the figures issued on the night of Oct. 6 that were compiled at both Liberal and Conservative committee rooms.

Total votes cast were: Henry, 11,260; McConnell, 11,051; Arthur H. Williams, 6,008, and Dempster 234. Three hundred and fifty votes were rejected, 48 cancelled and 25 declined, making a total vote cast of 28,976, compared with 30,082 in the last provincial election.

According to Mr. Kennedy there are 45,256 on the voters' list in York East riding and 16,976 failed to cast their vote for any candidate.
