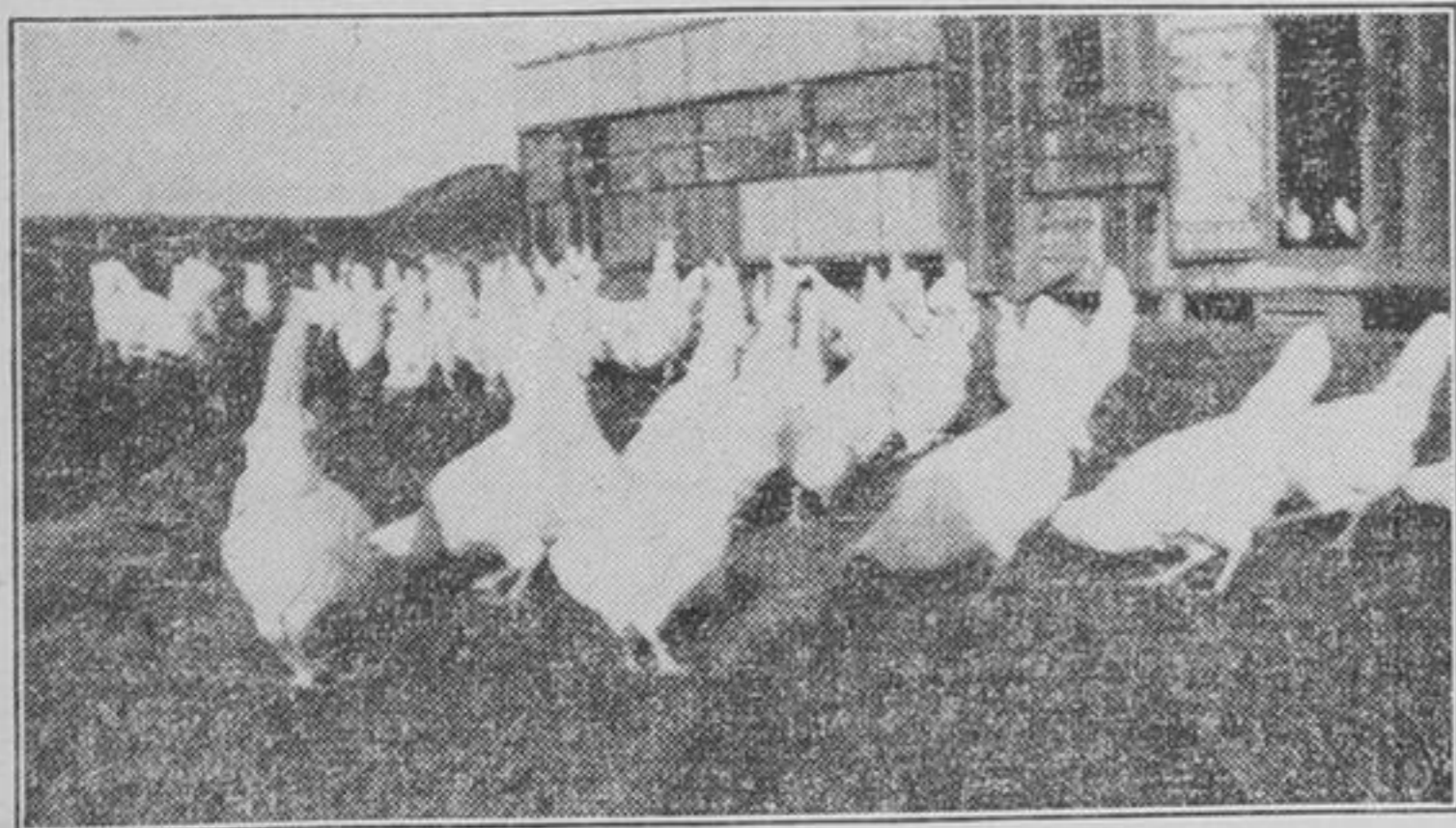

Purchase Proves Two-Way Blessing

Cheques will be received by the
vegetable growers of the Holland
Marsh within a few days totalling
about \$17,400 for vegetables purchas-
ed this fall by the Dominion Govern-
ment for the distressed areas of
Western Canada.

A total of 140 marsh farmers benef-
itted to the extent of from \$25 to
\$600 each, the average amount being
about \$125. Most of the vegetables
were purchased in the vicinity of the
Dutch village of Ansnorveld.

Besides proving a wonderful aid
to the drought-stricken people of the
West, the purchase of the vegetables
proved a great blessing to many in
the East who had an unsaleable sur-
plus of vegetables on their hands.—
Aurora Banner.
