paid tribute to the ratepayers for their co-operation which was a big factor in the improved financial position of the township. I am sorry he said that there are still roads in Vaughan which are not as good as they should be. But he said the last few years have been difficult ones for everyone and I think the council acted wisely in not increasing the levy in such times. But now that finances are getting better we are able to do some badly needed road-work. There is no doubt he said that the amount of present day traffic and the speed of traffic is demanding better roads. To my mind better maintenance of our roads is essential. It must be one of the most important features of our road program.

James H. Robson, member of the 1937 council seeking re-election stated that while considerable good work had been accomplished in the past year there were still some roads "we're not very proud of". I am sure he said we are all pleased with the splendid financial statement presented by our treasurer. It is even better than we figured on when we started the year. As members of council we have worked hard and closely watched all expenditure and now our reward is the splendid showing of the annual financial statement. I am standing for re-election as a councillor for 1938 and wish all a Happy New Year.

J. A. Dick, member of council for the last three years and a candidate for re-election praised clerk and treasurer McDonald for his efficient services, and paid tribute to Reeve Bob Scott as an excellent financier. We have tried to keep expenses down where we have control of expenditure and we have spent more on our roads. I am glad we have, as they needed it. I agree with the previous speaker who emphasized the importance of maintenance. I believe in properly maintaining a road and having the work done when it should be. When I entered council three years ago one of my aims was to see that school sections got their money by December 31st. There has been a big improvement and this year we have nearly accomplished it. I am a candidate for council and ask your support, but if there is an election I will not be able to make any canvass of the township.

Robert W. Dooks, who is standing as candidate for Reeve reviewed township municipal history when Reeve George Kellam was in line for York County wardenship.

"If I had opposed Kellam at that time and even if I had beaten him I would have been as popular at County Council as a skunk in your henhouse. I have nothing unkind to say about the last year's council, but I ask you to recall the situation three years ago. I am out for the Reeveship if there's an election and if you see fit to vote for me I'll appreciate it. I wish you all the compliments of the season.

Duncan McMurchy a former member of council standing for election this year delivered an interesting address featured by an appeal for the abolition of the County Council as a part of our governing system. It is one part of our system of government which I think we can get along perfectly well without, he said. What have we ever got from the County Council we couldn't have got just as well through our local council or the Legislature? In recent years a great deal of the responsibility has been taken from the County Council. The province now pays the entire cost of Old Age Pensions, Mothers Allowance and provincial highways to which the county used to contribute. When the province assumed the cost of these services we should have got a larger reduction than we received in our county rate this year. The County Council is great at spending, he said. A suggestion has been made to divide the county at Steele's corners, but I don't think we would be rid of our troubles until we abolished the County Council altogether. Mr. McMurchy said that he believed some credit was due the 1937 township council for their handling of the finances but credit was also due to the ratepayers for the manner in which they met their tax obligations. He stated he would be a candidate for council for 1938.

Cyril Baker of Richvale who is seeking election to council appealed to the electors to elect someone to council besides farmers. "I don't know anything about building roads," he said, "but I do know something of the problems of those who live at the front of the Township. There always will be relief he said unless a lot of moving takes place."
