JUSTICE M'PHILLIPS DIES Victoria, Jan. 25 .- Death of Mr. Justice A. E. McPhillips yesterday in hospital here ended a distinguished legal and political career. He was 77.

Member of the British Columbia court of appeal, Mr. Justice McPhillips had been in hospital since his collapse two weeks ago at the court house.

Born in Richmond Hill, Ontario, March 21, 1861, he was the son of George McPhillips, an Irish-born surveyor who helped survey Toronto, and who came to Fort Garry in 1870 to survey, bringing with him \$100,-000 the first Dominion subsidy to Manitoba.
