Reforestation

Planting or Natural Reproduction By I. C. Marritt

There has been an intense interest in conservation and reforestation other articles too numerous to the past two years in Southern Ontario. It is realized by many thinking people that too great a percentage of the land has been cleared in the fine agricultural sections, and there are many thousands acres of sub-marginal lands that are growing practically nothing of value, but fair financial returns would be received if trees were growing. Much of this poor land has to be planted as there are no seed trees.

Floods are liable to occur on many of the rivers and creeks, wells and springs go dry, and winds have an open sweep, thus making it more difficult to grow agricultural crops. Reforestation is a necessity in On-

tario. The method and the agency that should do the work should be determined. Many think only of planting when reforestation is mentioned. They do not realize that reforestation includes natural reproduction. An area can be reforested naturally if there are trees growing on or adjacent to the area that is to be reforested.
