History

A large congregation attended Berkeley Street United Church Sunday night to hear Miss Belle Thompson give a sketch of the life of the late Ann Preston, who became

known as "Holy Ann" and was later

recognized as a saint. "Holy Ann," the speaker said, was born in Ireland and entered service as a domestic in the home of Dr. and Mrs. Reid in Ireland. She came to Canada with the Reid family and settled at Thornhill. Later she -noved to Toronto and attended Berkeley Street Church. 
