FARM BOYS' CLUBS FOR 1938

It has just been announced by the local Agricultural Representative, W. M. Cockburn, Newmarket, that the programme of boys' club work for last year will be carried on again for 1938, with the addition of at least one new club. Formation of a new Boys' Potato Club in the Mount Albert district was especially asked for by Mr. Cockburn and approval granted by the Dept. of Agriculture.

The Calf Club which was so successfully sponsored last year by the Woodbridge Agricultural Society for the boys west of Yonge St. will be operated for another year and several of the boys have their calves already. Markham Foal Club, sponsored by the Agricultural Society there, promises to have a membership still larger than last year. The north end of the County offers the boys an opportunity through Grain Clubs which we understand will likely be sponsored by a local service club. The boys in the 1937 Club will seed at least five acres with the product of last year's acre which was sown to registered seed. New members will start off with two bushels of registered oats or barley which the Agricultural Representative will assist them to secure. All this seed will be treated by the boys with the new mercury dust treatment to prevent smut, root rot, crown rot, blights and other diseases.

The ages in this club work are 12 to 20 inclusive, except in the Foal Club where the minimum age is fourteen. All boys interested should get in touch with the Department of Agriculture at Newmarket or the secretary of the sponsoring organization.

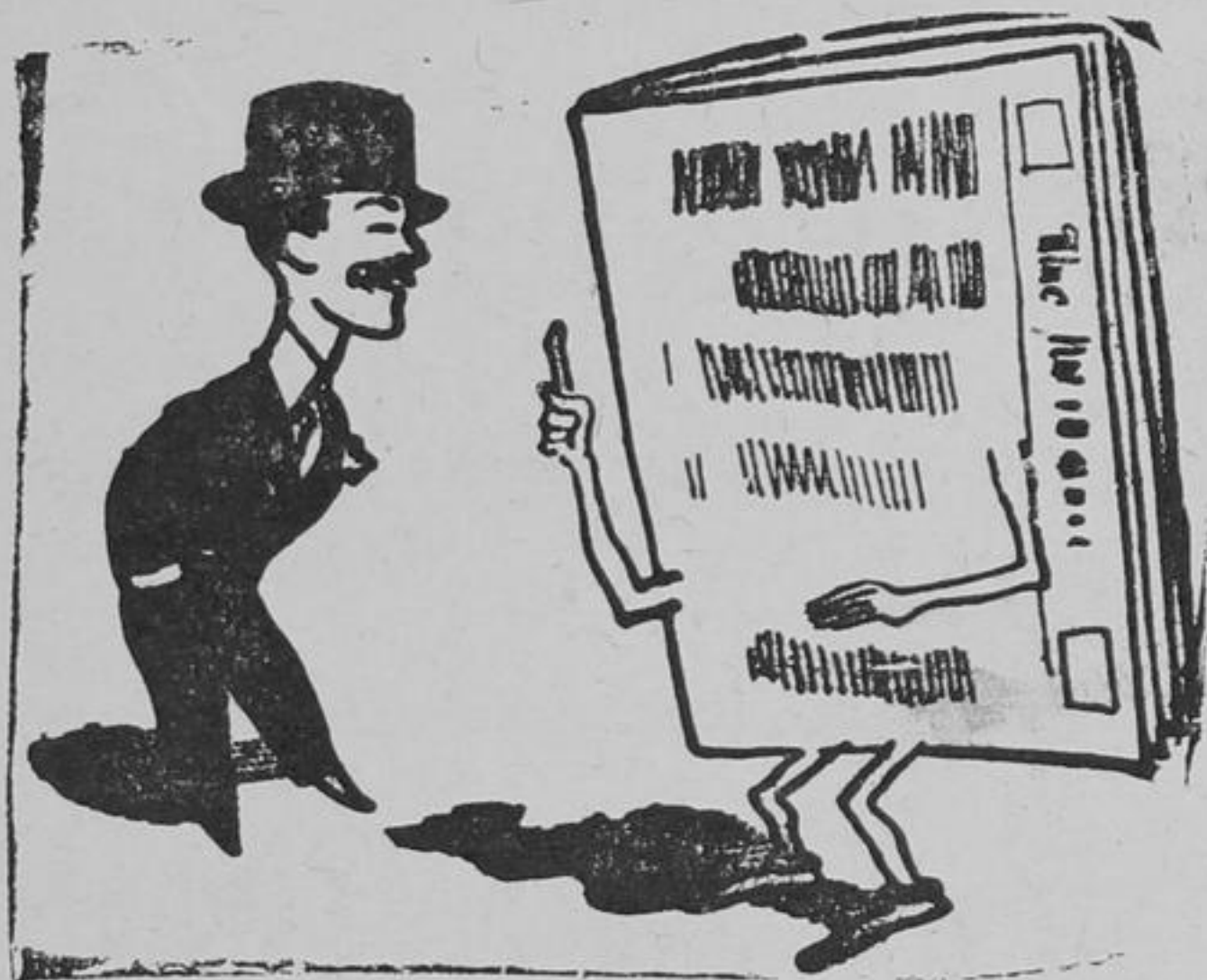
