Note and Comment

Reeve W. E. MacDonald of New Toronto who was warden of York county last year has announced that he will retire from municipal politics in June, when he will resign his position as reeve to enable him to devote his entire time to his own business.

"Local politics are taken so seriously in the suburban area that those who disagree with a public man are prone to make a personal issue of the disagreement," Reeve MacDonald asserted. "I sincerely believe that my professional and business success has been hampered by reason of bad friendships I have made through municipal and political service."

Right Hon. George P. Graham, member of the Canadian Senate since 1926 celebrated his 79th birthday on March 31st. Mr. Graham was born in Renfrew county. He was member of the Ontario Legislature for Brockville from 1898 to 1907. For a part of 1907 he was Liberal leader in the Ontario Legislature. For a brief period he was provincial secretary in the Ross Government which was defeated in 1905. In 1907 he resigned his seat in the legislature to be elected to the House of Commons by acclamation for the riding of Brockville, after having been appointed Minister of Railways and Canals in the Laurier Government. In the general election of 1911 he was defeated in Brockville and in a by-election in 1912 was elected to the House of Commons in South Renfrew. In 1921 he was elected in South Essex. From 1921 to 1923 was Minister of Militia and Defence and from 1923 to 1925 was Minister of Railways and Canals. In June 1925 he was appointed a member of the Imperial Privy Council from which comes the designation "Right Hon." and in the general election of 1925 was defeated in South Essex. In the following year he was appointed to the Senate. In his first attempt to win a seat in the legislature he was defeated by Sir James P. Whitney in Dundas.

If the provincial government would promise to assume all county council debenture debt, we feel that the proposal to abolish county councils would receive very strong public support.
