High School Notes

Madeleine Rumble, Gordon Cunningham and Jean Walwin Winners in Competition

The verse-speaking competition, as the first of its kind in the High School, created great interest. The judges called back several of the eighteen entrants to give a second reading in the group other than their first choice. From these they chose as the first three Madeleine Rumble, Jean Walwin and Gordon Cunningham. Their next task, to choose two from these three to represent the school at the Provincial Competition proved most difficult. Forced at last to come to a decision by repeated messages that the Literary Society was waiting, they chose Madeleine Rumble and Gordon Cunningham who will go to Toronto to compete for the Provincial Championship Wednesday, April 20. Rev. Claude Secrett gave the judges' decision and Miss Pittman in giving the awards spoke of the awakening interest in oral verse reading as a means of revealing the beauty of our language and of enriching our experience since only the best literature lends itself to such reading. The prizes were donated by Miss Izzard, to Madeleine Rumble, the Oxford Book of Lyrical Verse, to Gordon Cunningham John Buchan's Life of Sir Walter Scott and to Jean Walwin Poems of Rupert Brooke.

At this final meeting of the Literary Society cash prizes were also awarded to the contributors to The Tatler: Story, Dorothy Barraclough; Article, Jack Campbell; Poem, Elfrida Roberts; Humour, Bill Carr; Art, Jack Webb. Financial statements were given by Harold Sanderson, business manager of The Tatler and Hazel Cherry, treasurer of the Literary Society, both of which were gratifying. The Glee Club gave four new selections: Spring Heaven, The Whistling Farmer Boy, Passing By and The Dwarfs' Song from Snow White. Jean Robinson, the secretary, read a letter setting forth conditions in Saskatchewan schools after which the Society passed a resolution to adopt a school in Saskatchewan. The Highways Department then presented the educational film, "Safety First."

AGREES WITH PROPOSAL TO ABOLISH COUNTY COUNCIL

Single Men Will Be Taxed \$5.00

Single male residents of Woodbridge, 21 to 60 years, will pay a \$5.00 annual poll tax, council decided last Monday. Rigid enforcement of the by-law with Constable George Scott as collector was recommended. Payment of the tax will not entitle the men to municipal election votes, said Reeve N. George Wallace.

At the suggestion of Councillor John Dalziel the council also took steps to tax out-of-town bakers peddling and selling their bread in Woodbridge. The town solicitor will be asked to draw up a by-law to this effect. The fee of \$25 was thought probable. Eight bakeries are believed affected, mostly Toronto firms. The council decided to donate 1/3 of the hall rent, caretaking services and fuel costs for the short course held here last January. Vaughan Township have agreed to pay the other 2/3, it was stated.

REEVE RENNIE HEADS FORESTRY COMMITTEE

Reeve James Rennie of Markham Township is chairman of the district zone of the provincial committee for Forest Preservation. The province is divided into five zones and the executive of the five districts will meet in Toronto next Monday to discuss reforestation and conservation problems.
