PROCLAMATION DAYLIGHT SAVING

CHANGE TO SUMMER TIME

April 24th to September 25th, 1938

WHEREAS the Municipal Council has authorized me to issue a proclamation requesting the citizens to observe a period of Daylight Saving for the current year, commencing at 2 o'clock a.m. on Sunday, April 24th, and continuing until 2 o'clock a.m. on Sunday, September 25th.

To carry out this request of the Municipal Council, it will be necessary that all clocks and watches be advanced one hour at 2 o'clock a.m. on Sunday, April 24.
