> Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, present Under-Secretary for War in the British Government is a grand-son of the first peer of that name FRIDAY, APRIL 22nd who was well known as a resident of Canada by the name of Donald Smith. Donald Smith came to Canada from Forres, Scotland in 1837 at the age of 18. In the employ of the Hudson's Bay Company he spent 13 years on the bleak coast of Labrador and 17 years in the regions adjacent to the Hudson Bay. In 1868 he was appointed Canadian manager of that company with headquarters in Montreal. He was one of the original directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway and was a first cousin of the first president of the company, George Stephen (afterwards Lord Mount Stephen). These two were the founders of the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal to the building of which they contributed one million dollars. He was the first representative of the riding of Selkirk, Manitoba in the House of Commons, where he was elected in 1871 and 1872 as a Conservative, in 1874 as a Liberal and in 1878 as a Conservative again. From 1887 to 1896 he was Conservative member for Montreal West. In 1886 he was knighted and in 1897 was elevated to the peerage.
