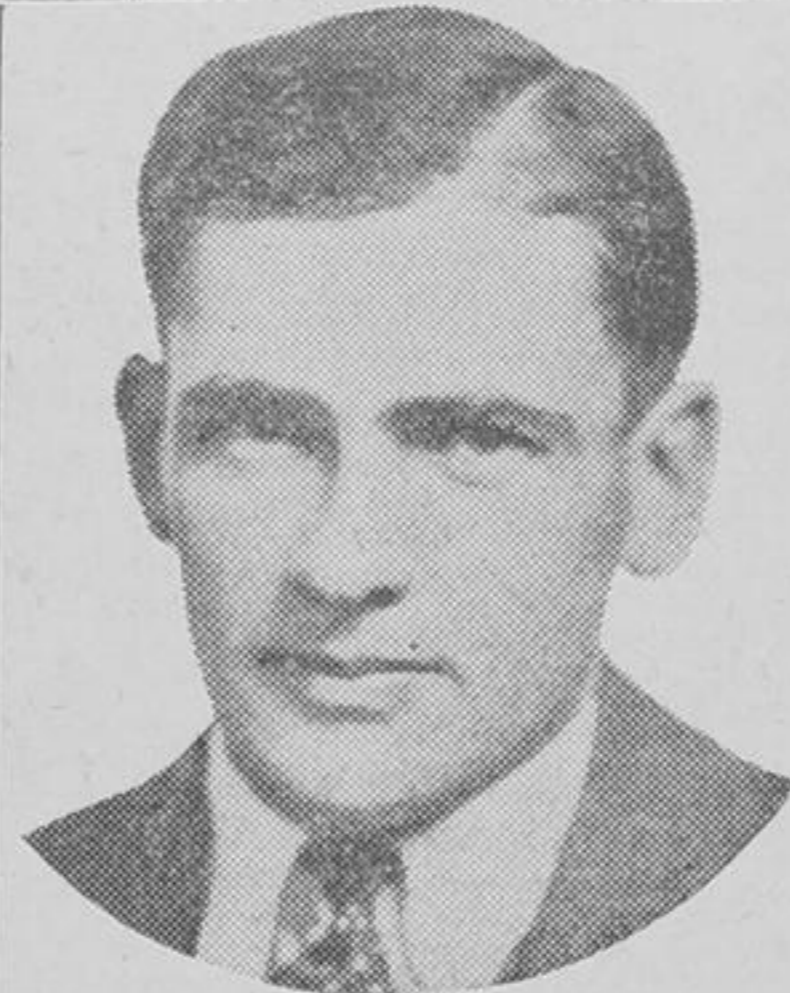

F.J. Mansbridge Local Merchant Passes Suddenly

On behalf of the Society President Charles appeals to the citizens of the district for support for the annual Fair and extends an invitation to horsemen everywhere to be exhibitors in the many attractive classes in this year's prize list.

The sudden death occurred Wednesday morning of Fred J. Mansbridge, a highly esteemed citizen of Richmond Hill, who has been one of the district's well known business men for the past twenty-four years. Last summer he suffered a severe heart illness which confined him to his home for several weeks, but he had recovered and of late had resumed his usual activities. The morning of his passing he was around as usual and while making a business call was suddenly stricken.

In his seventieth year the late Frederick John Mansbridge was born in Romsey, England and came to Canada in 1908. He engaged in the retail meat and provision business in Toronto until 1914 when he came to Richmond Hill and established a business here. He was a successful business man and keenly interested in the life of the community, having served for a time as a member of the Richmond Hill municipal council. He was an enthusiastic member of the Richmond Hill Bowling Club and the Richmond Hill Curling Club and in both these organizations was widely known as a genuine lover of the game.

He was an active and devoted member of St. Mary's Anglican Church where at various times he held many offices and to which he gave his whole-hearted support.

He is survived by his widow, formerly Agnes Witt and two sons, Robert and Edward, both of Richmond Hill, who have the sincere sympathy of the community in their sudden bereavement.

The funeral will be held from his late residence, Yonge Street Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock D.S.T., followed by a service in St. Mary's Anglican Church. Interment will follow in Richmond Hill cemetery.

LATE MRS. MARY HART
Mary Thompson, widow of the late John Hart passed away suddenly early Sunday morning at her home, Arnold Street. Although not in the best of health for the past three years Mrs. Hart was around as usual on Saturday and some time after retirement passed peacefully away. Deceased was in her 71st year and was born at Temperanceville, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Thompson. In July 1891 she was married to John Hart of King Township and shortly afterwards moved to the second concession of Markham Township where they resided until after Mr. Hart's death twenty-one years ago when the family moved to Richmond Hill. Of a quiet disposition Mrs. Hart was devoted to her home and friends, always a good neighbor in time of trouble. The family left to mourn her loss are: Mrs. Harold Smith of Elmira, Mrs. R. Hillaby of this village, Daisy and John at home, three sisters and three brothers, Mrs. Sarah McDonald of Thornhill, Mrs. W. Monkman of King City, Mrs. R. Bentley of Toronto, John Thompson, Schomberg Junction, Charles Thompson, Weston and Geo. Thompson on the old homestead at Temperanceville, also six grandchildren.

The funeral on Tuesday afternoon from her late residence was attended by a large number of friends and relatives. Rev. C. W. Follett of Richmond Hill United Church conducted the service and the pallbearers were 6 nephews, William and Norman McDonald, Nelson and Duncan Thompson, Walter and Thomas Monkman. Many beautiful floral tributes were evidence of the high esteem in which the deceased was held. Interment followed in Richmond Hill Cemetery.

LATE ARTHUR MACKIE
Arthur R. Mackie, son of Mrs. Mackie and the late Robert Mackie of Richmond Hill passed away at the Hospital for Incurables in Toronto on Monday, April 25th. Born in East Gwillimbury Township June 24, 1900 he has lived in this district since 1902 when his parents moved to their farm in Markham township just east of Richmond Hill. He had been ill for the past eleven years. The funeral was held from the family residence Wednesday afternoon, the service being conducted by Rev. J. D. Cunningham of Richmond Hill Presbyterian Church. A large number of floral tributes was evidence of the sincere sympathy of a wide circle of friends. Interment followed in Richmond Hill cemetery, the pall bearers being Fred Hopper, J. W. Palmer, Wesley Wellman, I. D. Ramer, John Leece, and David Patton.
