Richmond Hill, Ont.,  
November 29, 1938.

To the Editor,  
Richmond Hill Liberal  
Dear Mr. Editor:—  
An orchid to Reeve Greene for his stand on the radial question. And what good news that some action will be taken to urge the widening of Yonge Street from Steele's Corners to Richmond Hill.

When the residents of Yonge St. in this village undertook the burden of extra taxation to pay for the widening of the road through here, it was on the definite assurance that a similarly wide highway was to be built ALL THE WAY from Toronto. This promise has not been kept, resulting in great inconvenience and loss of business through the notorious highway congestion that obtains every summer around Richmond Hill.

The original promise to widen the road all the way did not involve giving up the radial. If it had, I am quite sure the majority would not have agreed to it.  
We tried buses once and, for those who remember this unhappy period, once was quite enough. The only people in Richmond Hill willing to give up a reliable radial service for a hit and miss bus line are those few who just use a car line when no other means of transportation can get through. They would do well, however, to remember the occasions every winter when the radial cars are the only safe and sure means of getting to and from Toronto.
