Son of Famed Rabbi To Speak at Forum

James W. Wise Will Answer Vital Question "Can Europe Survive?"

One of the world's most widelytravelled students of social, economic and political questions will be the speaker at the second lecture in the current Holy Blossom Forum series, which will be held at the Holy Blossom Temple, Toronto, on Monday evening, December 12.

The speaker will be James Waterman Wise, noted traveller, author, lecturer and war correspondent. He is the son of the famed Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of New York, and has devoted himself entirely to the problems of youth and progressive move-

In his address at the Holy Blossom Forum next Monday night, he will discuss the question: "Can Europe Survive?" Mr. Wise has qualified himself to speak on this subject by a recent extensive European tour, during which he visited all the centres where epochal world events were shaking the foundations of Europe's social and political structure.

Previous to his last trip, Mr. Wise visited Egypt, Russia and Palestine and made exhaustive and searching studies into social and economic con-On the following Tuesday evening ditions in those countries. At present, Mr. Wise is active in an organization which in the past few years has become influential and outstanding for its liberal doctrines He is serving on the national council of the American League for Peace and Freedom, and is also affiliated with the American Labor Party, the American Committee for the Protection of the Foreign Born, and the China Aid Council.

Two of his books, "Swastika-The Nazi Terror" and "Nazism-An Assault On Civilization," are recognized as leading studies of the world's most vital problem of today.
