The classes in Agriculture will include a practical discussion of the problems of live stock, crop, feeds and feeding, dairying, poultry, farm conveniences, soils, fertilizers, insect pests, plant diseases, etc., with practice in live stock judging, killing and culling of poultry, seed cleaning and judging.

The Home Economics classes will include Household Science and Clothing. The former will embrace |a study of foods and cookery and the various phases of household management while the clothing class will cover a study of cloths, clothing, use of patterns and the actual making of a dress by each girl.

Although these courses are primarily for the young people over 16 years of age, anyone may enroll. A registration fee of 50c. is charged for the purchase of practice material. The class for the ladies is particularly for girls and young married women but the boys' classes will welcome any of the farmers, any or
