

### Vaughan Council Opening Meeting

Vaughan township municipal council met in regular session Monday morning at eleven o'clock. Rev. A. E. Cooke of Thornhill United Church was in attendance and at the formal opening proceedings made appropriate remarks and offered up prayers. Reeve Robert W. Scott congratulated his fellow-members on their reelection and asked for their continued co-operation in carrying on the work of the municipality.

Clerk J. M. McDonald reported that tax payments for 1938 to be considerably improved over 1937. At December 31st payment of current year's taxes amounted to \$72,990.57 and the amount of current levy unpaid was \$18,067.93. At December 31st, 1937 there was \$23,568 of the current year's levy unpaid.

Relief payments for the month totalled \$1696.77 which was approximately the same as in the corresponding month a year ago, but considerably less than in 1936.

A report showed that there are nine students from Vaughan attending the Aurora High School.

### Lions Carnival Thurs. January 26

#### Local Service Club Has Made Worth-While Contribution To Community Welfare

Richmond Hill Lions Club will sponsor a carnival to be held at the arena Thursday evening, January 26, and the event promises to attract a record crowd. There will be many feature attractions and several lucky number prizes will be given. The proceeds will be used for the club's activities in the interests of the underprivileged children of the district.

Since the Lions Club was organized here less than a year ago the organization has quietly and without blare of trumpets carried on a very commendable work and has made a worthwhile contribution to the community.

Already the club's accomplishments include the financing of three tonsil operations and at present nineteen other cases have been approved by the committee and submitted to the attention of a medical doctor. Twenty children have been listed for dental care and will be taken care of as soon as time and finances permit. Necessary milk is being supplied daily to twenty children in need of this additional nourishment. The club engaged a qualified nurse who was here for two weeks making a health survey of the children attending the public school. Fifty cases were discovered needing some attention to some physical defect and confidential reports were sent to parents of these children. Grants of \$25 have been made to welfare funds at the local public and high schools and \$10 was given by the club to the Community Christmas fund. The above includes only some of the service activities of the Lions Club since its organization here but it gives some idea of the splendid work being carried on by the Lions. We are sure that backed up by such a worthwhile record of service any appeal by the club will receive a generous response from the citizens. All will have an opportunity to help along this work by buying tickets for the carnival Thursday, January 26th.

### OBITUARY

#### ADRIENNE ARNOLD GREEN

Mrs. Adrienne Arnold Green died at her home 58 Grenville St., Toronto, on Monday, January 9th. Yesterday she was laid to rest at St. Mary's Anglican Church, Richmond Hill.

She was the last member of the family of the late John R. Arnold of "The Hermitage," an old landmark at the south of the village.

When Mr. and Mrs. Arnold gave the beautiful site at the top of the hill to build the church in 1872, they reserved a private plot which is surrounded by a wrought iron fence. Adrienne Green was buried there beside her late husband, George de Warrenne Green, her father and mother, her eldest sister, Blanche, and her husband Dr. Evans of Toronto, and Edith Arnold who died when a young lady.

They are all gone; but far into the country can be seen the spire of the church which was built by the first Rector, the Rev. Robert Shanklin, assisted by the late John Arnold and the small congregation of that day. "The good that you do lives after you."
