## Children's Aid Societies Render Great Service

There is a general misunderstanding of the work of Children's Aid Societies in Ontario, observed Hon. Eric Cross in a brief summation of the work of the Department of Public Welfare under whose direction the Societies operate.

"Taxpayers of Ontario are saved many thousands of dollars annually as a result of preventative work done by the Societies," the Minister declared, "and because of the very nature of this work, the public generally has had slight inkling of its effectiveness. We fully recognize the importance of keeping children in a proper home environment wherever possible, and this is a fixed policy of the Societies. The former system of utilizing shelters has been discarded in favor of adoptions, boarding homes and free homes, a plan which has met with marked success. There are untold instances School Room. where Societies have succeeded in home conditions so that the children would not become charges upon the community and the Province."

Ontario has 53 Children's Aid Societies, he continued, and in the year ending last March, these had supervision over the lives of 19,769 children living in their own homes. This is a service rendered by the Societies which is not generally appreciated and represents a direct financial saving to the Ontario taxpayer.

Mr. Cross pointed out that the maintenance of children is not met by the municipality until such children are made wards of the Society. Of the 19,769 children mentioned before, only 1,076 have had to be made wards.

"There is much misunderstanding of the functions of the Societies," the Minister of Public Welfare asserted. "They are, in reality, private organizations, dependent upon the goodwill of private citizens for the financial support that enables them to give the protective service to child- be held on Wednesday evening, Febren in their own homes.
