

OBITUARY

LATE MRS. WILLIAM FUREY
After a lingering illness, Mrs. Margaret Furey, widow of Sergt. Major William Furey, late of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police died Monday, February 20th at her home, 32 Dundurn street north, Hamilton. Her age was 86 years. Prior to her marriage, Mrs. Furey, was Miss Margaret Thomson, and her birthplace was Puslinch. For some time she resided at Richmond Hill. In religion she belonged to the Anglican faith. Surviving her are two nieces, Mrs. Wilfred Woodcock, with whom she resided, and Mrs. May Brown, of this city, and a nephew, James Kerr, of Hamilton. The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon, February 22 from Truscott Brothers' funeral home, thence to Killan cemetery for interment.

LATE MARGARET WHITE
The funeral of the late Margaret White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur White, Mill Street, Richmond Hill, was held from St. Mary's Anglican Church last Saturday afternoon and was very largely attended by friends and relatives. Margaret passed away suddenly in the Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto, Tuesday, February 21st following an operation, and her death cast a gloom over the entire community where she was so well known and popular with all who knew her. The funeral was held on her 13th birthday.

The service was conducted by Rev. W. F. Wrixon, Rector of St. Mary's, who left a sick bed to take charge of the funeral, and interment followed in Richmond Hill cemetery. Juvenile Court Hamilton of the I.O. O.F. attended in a body and those attending the service included many former school-mates and young friends. The honorary pallbearers were Gloria Anderson, Lenore Dewsbury, Irene Rose, Helen Ransom, Kathleen Butler and Jean McCartney, and the active pallbearers: Merlin Graham, Stanley Baker, Murray Bowes, Kenneth Shields, Dick Baker, Murray Hunt.

A large number of beautiful floral tributes were evidence of the esteem and affection of a wide circle of friends and of the sincere sympathy extended to the bereaved family. At last Sunday's morning service Rev. J. D. Cunningham of Richmond Hill Presbyterian Church made touching reference to Margaret's passing and extended sympathy to the family in the great loss they have sustained.

LATE J. THOMPSON
Employee as a sectionman on the old Canadian Northern at Gormley for 25 years and retired for the last ten years, Jabez Thompson was laid to rest at Heise Hill cemetery on February 12. He had been in declining health for some time before his death. The funeral was largely attended, service being in charge of Rev. I. Brubacher in the Menomite Church at Gormley, assisted by Rev. A. T. Gooding.
Born in Yorkshire, England, the late Mr. Thompson came to Canada as a young man of nineteen. In 1885

he united in marriage with Eva May Williams of Musseman's Lake. For 25 years he was employed at Gormley on the section, being foreman of the division first with the Canadian Northern and latterly with the C.N.R. since they took over the line. He was converted and joined the M.B.C. church there 40 years ago, and was a sincere christian gentleman highly esteemed.

Thirteen years ago he suffered the loss of his beloved wife, but there survives the parents' two daughters, Mary at home, and Mrs. Sutton of Mt. Dennis, also three sons, Fred of Montreal, and Frank and William in Mount Dennis. There are four grandchildren.

For ten years now Mr. Thompson had enjoyed a retired life around Gormley where he was known to everybody and to a large number of close friends who with the family mourn his departure.

LATE MRS. GRACE BOYNTON
Mrs. Grace Boynton, widow of the late William Boynton, passed away Sunday, February 26th at the home of her son, Mr. Stanley Boynton, Victoria Square, after a short illness. Mrs. Boynton, who before her marriage was Grace Caseley, was born at Newtonbrook 85 years ago and lived in Markham Township all her life residing at Victoria Square the past fifty years. In 1881 she was married to William Boynton of the third concession of Markham and he predeceased her 33 years ago last October. Of a bright, cheerful disposition, Mrs. Boynton enjoyed the esteem of a wide circle of friends and took a keen interest in all worthwhile things of the church and district. Surviving her are 5 sons and one daughter, Wesley of Port Perry, William, Herbert and Roy of Toronto, Stanley of Victoria Square, and Mrs. C. H. Sanderson of Richmond Hill, also one brother, Richard Caseley of Thornhill, 19 grandchildren and one great grandchild.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon with private service at the home followed by service in the Victoria Square United Church in charge of her pastor, Rev. J. Macdonald of Victoria Square United Church, assisted by Rev. C. W. Follett of Richmond Hill United Church. Pallbearers were 4 grandsons, Donald Boynton of Galt, Frank and Douglas Boynton of Toronto, Harold Sanderson of Richmond Hill, and Ralph Boynton and Ralph Perkins of Victoria Square. Interment followed in Victoria Square Cemetery.
