York Market

Bitter winds howled round North York Market on Saturday, but inside everything suggested that spring is just around the corner. The first Canadian head lettuce or cabbage lettuce was in, and there were long orderly rows of fresh young salad things, cress, leaf lettuce, water-cress, green onions and radishes, all 3 for 10c.

Flower stands showed a variety of color, ranging from sweet peas, forget-me-nots, violets and primroses to stately calla lilies. There were golden daffodils in bunches or pots, fragrant freesia and narcissi, pastel-tinted stocks and snapdragons, vivid cinnerarias, multicolored polyanthus, velvety wallflowers and pansies and furry pussy willows. Prices began as low as 10c a bunch.

Six-quart baskets of onions for 15c. were a special in vegetables on the stand of a Langstaff grower of A1 produce. Five cents went a long way for vegetables; at this price there were piled up boxes of carrots, parsnips, beets or onions, as well as turnips, good heads of Savoy or harl cabbage and bunches of leeks. Potatoes were 20c. basket on most stands, mint and parsley, as well as many kinds of dried herbs, 5c.

Among the imports were cauliflower, 25c. each; peas, 50c. a basket; broccoli, iceberg lettuce, spinach and long cucumbers, as well as outdoor-grown tomatoes, which sold at 15c. lb. Rhubarb was selling in one-pound bunches at 2 for 15c. and 3 for 25c. There were plenty of good apples, Spys, Baldwins and russets, from 25c. to 35c. basket.

Egg prices were 25c., 28c. and 30c. with some small pullet eggs 20c. dozen and duck eggs 40c. Butter was 25c. lb. Fine roasting chickens were 28c. lb., broilers were not so plentiful and sold at 30c.; boiling fowl was 22c. and turkeys 35c. Nice meaty rabbits cost 60c. each. Fresh meat prices remained steady. Back bacon was 45c. lb., side 30c.; boiled ham and roast pork was 55c., jellied ox tongue 40c., ham bologna 30c., beef bologna and headcheese 15c., beef dripping 5c., lard 15c., 2 lbs. 25c., sausage 15c. and 25c. lb.
