Third Book In Year Is Record Of Local Author

Lieutenant William Guy Carr has just received word from London, England that he has crowned twenty years of pains-taking effort and research work by performing a literary 'hat-trick'. Messrs. Hutchinson have written to inform him that they will be pleased to publish his fifth book tentatively entitled "Wings out of the mists" this fall. This announcement means that Lieutenant Carr has had two books published and one other accepted for early publication within a year.

Last May "High and Dry" made its bow to the public at \$3.50 per copy being a library edition and dealing with the social, commercial, and economic conditions in Canada. On April 5th this year "Brass Hats and Bell Bottomed Trousers" was published and literary critics in England, Ireland, Scotland and other European countries gave it unanimous acclaim many leading newspapers considering the reviews worthy of two to four column headlines. "Brass Hats and Bell Bottomed Trousers" is the story of the thrilling deeds performed by officers and men who served in the 'Harwich Striking Force' during the war.

The Irish Times says "The authorities cannot help but use this book for the benefit of the Nation. It is a thrilling story, a popular history; popularly written and an accurate book of reference full of valuable information." The London papers predict it will be pictured and one suggests Jack Hulbert and Miss Court Neidge as most suitable for the leading roles. All reviewers give it first place of importance ahead of Adolph Hitler's newly translated unexpurgated edition of Mein Kampf.
