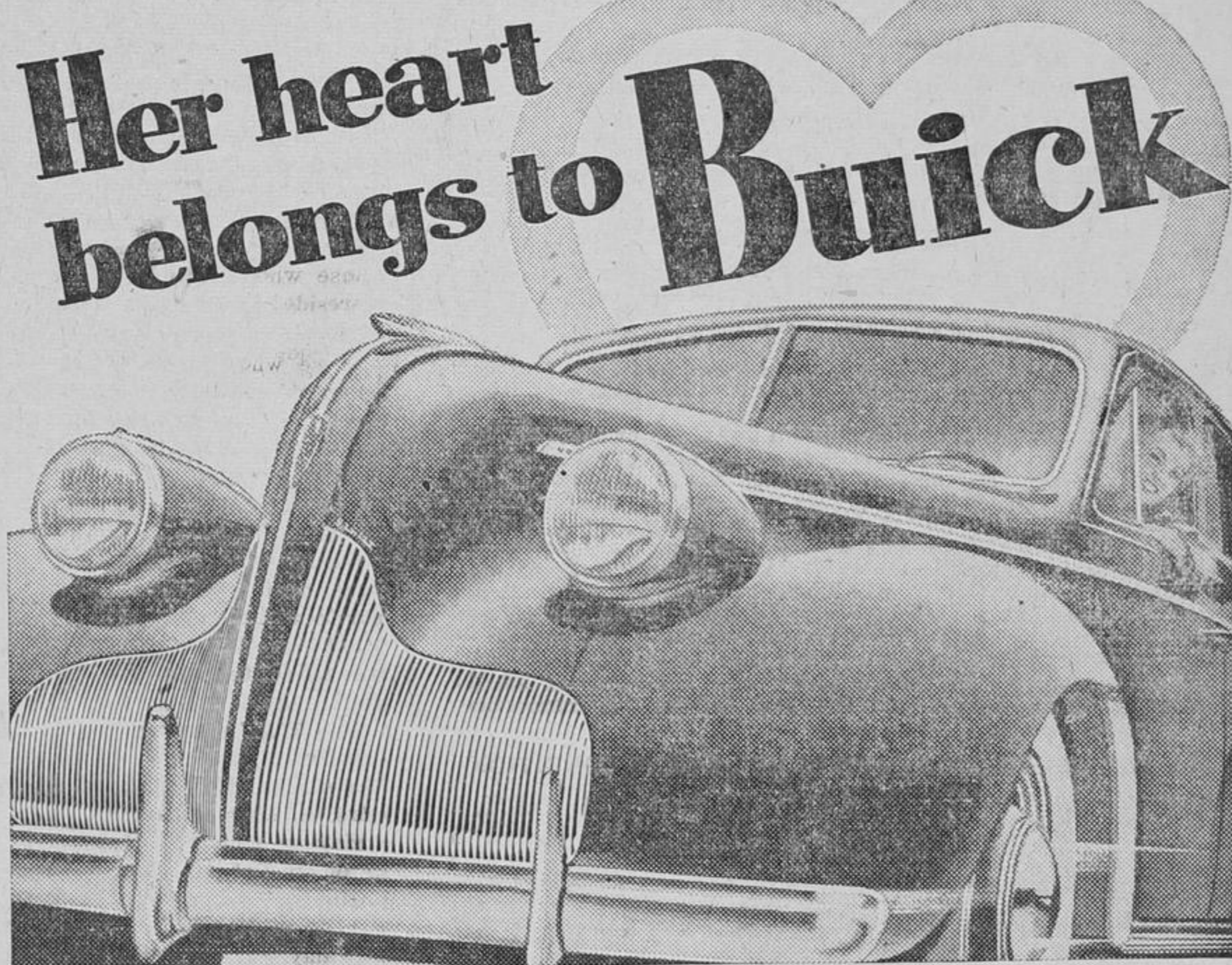

The decision will be welcomed across the Dominion, for the question of holidays has been one of great concern to the rural mail carriers for some years. Over 4,500 carriers will benefit by this decision. In announcing the granting of additional holidays, Hon. Mr. McLarty paid tribute to the conscientious and faithful services of rural mail carriers and expressed his confidence that there would be no impairment of the public service which the carriers have rendered. It is also felt the announcement will be welcomed by rural mail patrons who fully appreciate the service of the carriers.
