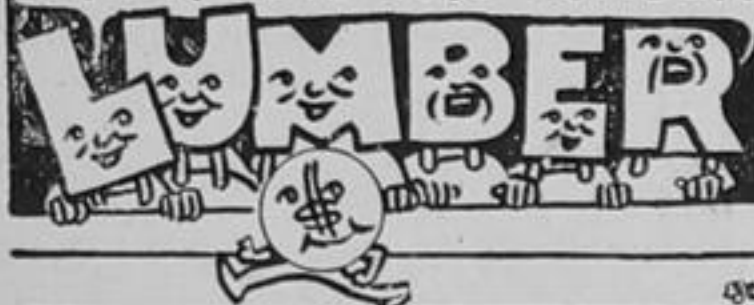

OBITUARY

LATE THOMAS H. KEYS The funeral of the late Thomas H. Keys who died Monday, May 15 was held from his late residence, Maple, on Wednesday, May 17th and was very largely attended. The late Mr. Keys who was in his eighty-fourth year was born in New Jersey, U.S.A. and came to Canada when he was five years old. He lived for a time in Woodbridge and at Concord but for the past thirty-five years has been a resident of Maple. For fifteen years he was assessor and tax collector for the Township of Vaughan and was an active member of Maple United Church. For sixty-four years he was a member of the Masonic order and was well and favorably known in fraternal circles. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. R. McCrimmon, assisted by Rev. C. H. Bowman. He is survived by his widow, formerly Henrietta White to whom he was married fifty-seven years ago, one son Cecil, three grandchildren, and one great grandson. Interment took place in Maple cemetery, the pallbearers being J. Shunk, T. Jackson, R. Keffer, J. Keffer, D. Allen, and C. Lines.

WOODBIDGE HOUSE PROVIDES ROYAL BOUQUET FLOWERS

A signal honour was conferred upon the Woodbridge area when carnations from Wm. Greene and Son's greenhouse were chosen to make up a huge basket presented to Her Majesty the Queen on behalf of the Horticultural Societies throughout Ontario.

The basket was presented at Queen's Park during the Royal visit on Monday. Mrs. Matthews, wife of the Lieutenant-Governor, made the presentation, according to Charles Green, the second half of the father and son partnership.

100 choice blooms of "Laddie", at least 3 feet in length of stem, were cut from the Green greenhouses. Of a delicate light salmon pink shade, they are of a choice variety not usually grown for general commercial purposes, Mr. Green reported.

William Green, 74, has been in the flower growing business for 65 years. A native of London, England, he commenced his career in that country, later accepting a position in Ireland where he developed a new rose, winning for his employers the Royal Appointment and the right to display the Royal Coat of Arms. His son, Charlie, who served in the Royal Air Force during the war, started in business with his father when they came to Canada about 21 years ago. Still comparatively small growers, they are elated at the honour falling their lot.

Special speakers occupied the pulpit of the Woodbridge Presbyterian Church last Sunday. In the morning the Rev. Norman A. MacEachern, D.D., a staff member of the Presbyterian Publications, addressed the large congregation attending a Royal Visit commemorative service. For this service music included the new Healey Willan anthem "All Hail the King", by the full choir, and a solo "Land of Hope and Glory" by Mr. Stanley Harper, the choir also singing the last chorus. The anthem was repeated by the choir at the evening service when the speaker was the Rev. George P. Duncan, D.D., of Toronto.

"CANADA CALLING" IN BRITAIN



Typical of scenes witnessed at cinemas in some of the principal cities in Britain these days is the above photograph, showing English schoolboys trooping into a theatre at Reading, England, to see a special screening of films provided by the Dominion Government.
