### TEACHERS ARE URGED TO STRESS SAFETY DURING ROYAL TOUR

Minister of Education Asks For Accident Decrease by School Children

#### NEED THEIR HELP

"Ontario school children will long remember the history-making events of the next two months in Canada," said Ontario Minister of Education Dr. J. L. Simpson in an interview today. He referred to the influence the schoolroom was having on children in connection with the forthcoming Canadian tour of Their Majesties King George and Queen Elizabeth.

"The strengthening of the ties of Empire is noticeable in the classrooms," said Dr. Simpson. "The broadening of the school curriculum affords teachers the opportunity of combining classroom subjects with current events, and the interest of children in Canadian geography is heightened as they study the itinerary of the Royal tour. Increased interest in Canadian and British history is being developed as children realize the importance and significance of the Royal tour."

Many Ontario schools, he said, were making plans to take thousands of children to central points where they would be able to see Their Majesties and join in the celebrations. Every cooperation was being given by educational authorities to local committees in charge of arrangements to ensure that the children would be safely cared for in travelling away from home and back again.

Children would welcome the chance, believed Dr. Simpson, to take an active part in the plans. He appealed to all teachers and parents to urge upon children the need for care and safety to assure that no accidents would mar the occasion of the Royal visit. Every possible precaution was being made, he pointed out, by highway traffic experts, police, civic officials, ex-servicemen and volunteer organizations to guard against the possibility of accidents, but they could not hope for a clear record without the help of every boy and girl throughout the province.

Dr. Simpson commended the efforts of Minister of Highways T. B. McQueen to pay tribute to the King and Queen by greatly reducing the number of highway accidents during the next two months.

The minister of education said his department would give every possible cooperation to the plan. He felt sure every Ontario teacher would help to impress on children the need for extra carefulness during the busy time of the Royal visit when traffic would be greatly increased.

He suggested the following points might be emphasized to children:

1. King George believes in safety and accident prevention. For many years he has served as patron and president of safety organizations in England.
2. An accident during the visit of the King and Queen will spoil the pleasure of their Canadian tour.
3. Help the smaller children to be careful.
4. Be sure to obey all traffic signs and instructions. They are made for your safety.
5. Look both ways before crossing the road and wait until there are no cars coming.
6. Never step out quickly into the street from behind parked cars or other obstructions.
7. Do not stand in the street; walk on the left-hand side of the road facing on-coming traffic if there is no sidewalk.
8. Hitchhiking rides on trucks or automobiles is dangerous. Avoid this foolish practice and don't let other children do it.

Dr. Simpson added that teachers and parents might well give their children any other safety instructions which would apply to local conditions or arrangements.

### Warning Notice Re Corn Borer

He stops at all schools and examines every child's teeth, doing the work where necessary at a fractional cost.
