In the Loyalist army Spanish beans for dinner and Mexican beans for supper with a small ration of bread was the only food obtainable in the last months of the struggle. Previously mule meat was freely used but in the end even the supply of mules was exhausted. The odd stray cat was the only meat supply he caid. The slaughter wrought by rebel bombing planes in cities bombed was indescribable. Women, ch'l dren and helpless civilians were killed by the thousand. The speaker expressed the opinion that the great democracies of the world would yet see their mistake in not coming to the assistance of the popular front government in Spain and opposing the march of fascism and
