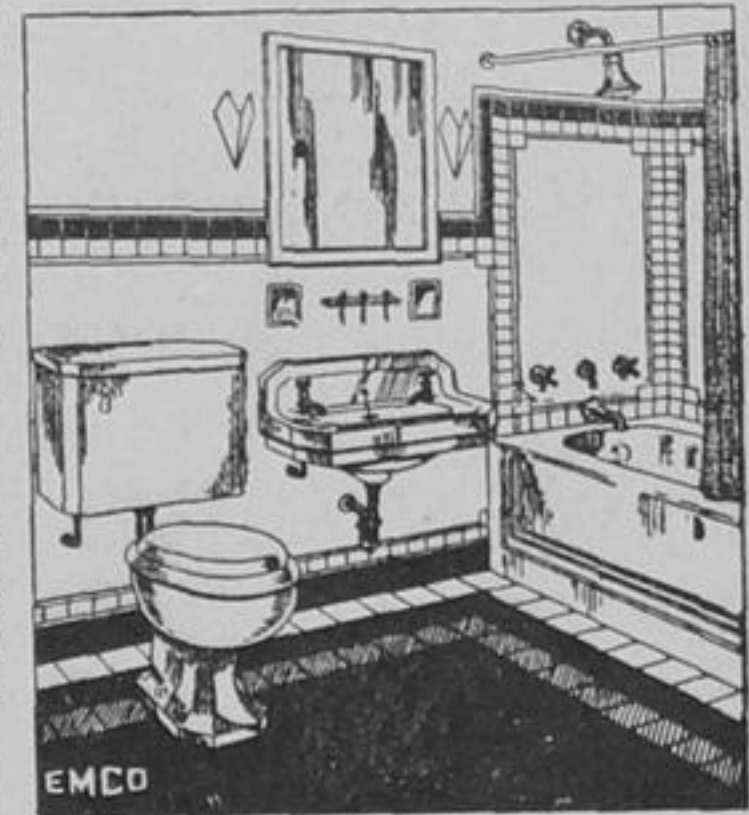

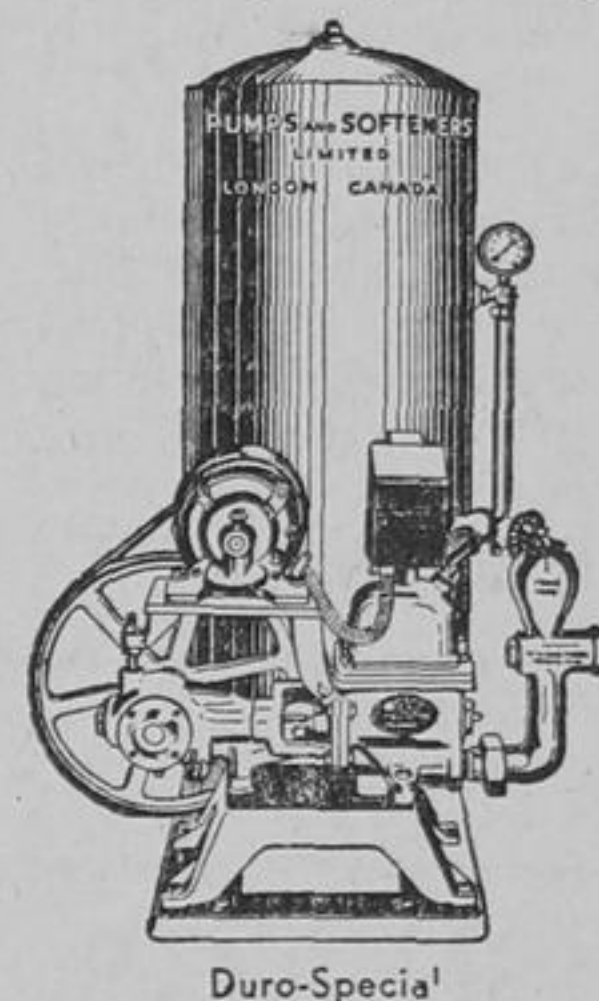

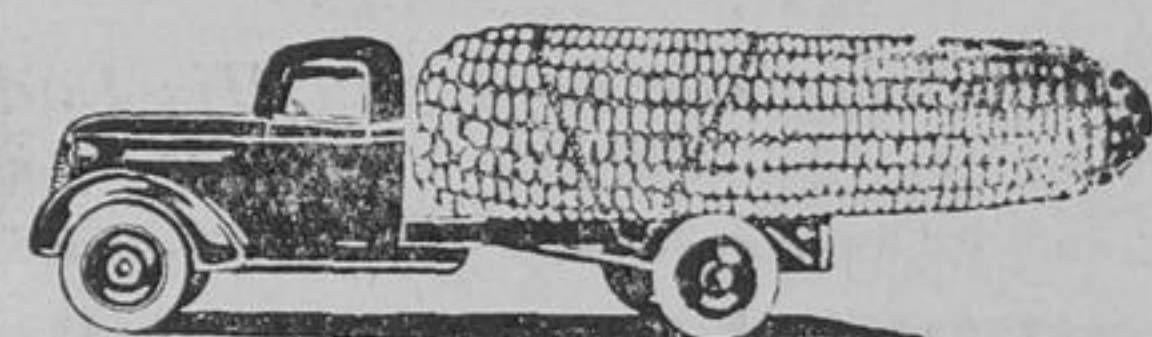

Chief Chef Louis Baltera, who has cooked for two former British Kings, and other world-famous figures will be in charge of both functions, assisted by Chef Raymond Charles Emil Ferry, European culinary expert and chef of the famous summer resort, Algonquin Hotel, St. Andrews-by-the-Sea.
