In spite of several counter attractions that day, approximately 400 were on hand to enjoy the interesting programme.

During the lunch hour, Hugh Colson, editor of the Holstein Journal, was called upon to introduce the guest speaker, Hon. Geo. S. Henry. Mr. Colson pointed out the contribution Mr. Henry has made to the development of the breed in York County. Mr. Henry referred to the early breeders of the Holstein, mentioning in particular R. F. Hicks of Newtonbrook, a former president of the club and a past president of the Canadian Holstein Association. The speaker urged members not to sacrifice type or milk production in an endeavour to build up high testing herds. He also reminded all breeders that the County Club is carrying on a programme for their benefit, and it was only fair that they should support the club in every way possible.

Jos. Darlington, Todmorden, field salesman of the Club, reported briefly on the work he is doing and emphasized the value of the blood test in building up a herd or securing a market for surplus stock.

Geo. W. Henry, President of the club, announced that arrangements have been completed for the holding of a "Black and White" show in co-operation with Markham Fair. This will be held on the Friday and all animals will secure equal prize money, some of the larger classes having ten prizes. Both Mr. Darlington and past president S. B. Watson of Agincourt, solicited support of this event, tried out so successfully last year at Port Perry and Roseneath.

R. M. Holtby, fieldman for the Canadian Assoc., took charge of the judging competition in which two classes were judged. 239 contestants took part and the following were the prize winners:
