BUTTER VOUCHERS TO BE DISTRIBUTED HERE

Vaughan Township council was notified Monday that it would receive some of the butter vouchers distributed by the Canadian government through the Red Cross. The vouchers will be distributed to each province on a ratio with the number of relief dependents. Families on relief will receive 80% of the vouchers and families not on relief that need assistance will receive 20%. The butter to be distributed will be a good grade of creamery butter and each family will receive an extra quota of pound for pound, i.e., double the amount they now receive. Vaughan's share of vouchers will be 2,414 vouchers for one pound; 192 vouchers for two pounds and 32 vouchers for three pounds. The vouchers will be given to local merchants who can cash them at the Bank of Canada.
