TRUCK STRUCK BY TRAIN
A large gasoline truck, carrying a heavy load, was struck by a C.N.R. passenger train Tuesday and severely damaged. Although gasoline and parts of the truck were strewn along the railway tracks, the driver, Fred Obee, 24, escaped injury.

The train, which was just coming into the Aurora station, was only travelling at ten miles an hour when it struck the truck, which at the time was in second gear, emerging from the McColl-Frontenac yards with its load of gas.

Visibility is extremely bad at the crossing, where the view to the north is almost completely blocked by a house on the corner.

Although neighbors reported having heard the train whistle as it neared the crossing, Fred Obee, truck driver, stated he heard no sound.

The truck, damaged to the extent of \$500, was towed to Toronto. There is no wig-wag or signal at the crossing.
