For some time council members

have been discussing a sewer system as an improvement needed in Richmond Hill and an expenditure which will have to be faced sometime in the future. Reeve Greene has over a long period urged members to keep the sewer project in mind in making other changes to the streets and to make long distance plans for the improvement. The matter was brought to a head recently by the announced policy of the Dominion government to give aid to municipalities for public works as an aid to employment. The Reeve has been in touch with the Dominion authorities and has assurance that the Federal government will pay fifty per cent of the labor costs if the work is done for unemployment relief and on condition the province will subscribe a similar amount. Before the government aid can be secured Reeve Greene explained to the members of council at a special meeting held last Thursday evening it is necessary that definite figures be submitted showing the extent and estimated cost. To secure this information it is necessary to employ a qualified engineer and the cost of such an estimate would be \$350.

The Reeve urged that the survey be made. If we have those figures we can approach the whole question of sewers intelligently, he said, and we can make application for the
