Carl Saigeon officiated as auctioneer and over 1500 items were disposed of which constitutes a big auction sale. Selling continued from noon until a quarter to nine standard time.

The J. A. Rose store, well situated at the corner of Keele Street and the Richmond Hill sideroad was bought by Frank Robson, son of councillor James A. Robson of Vaughan township at a price of \$3175. Mr. Robson who has operated a garage back of the Jones property will move into his new quarters September 1st.

The store stock, equipment and the furniture from the house all sold well. The piano brought \$97 and excellent prices were realized for other furniture and furnishings. Owing to the lateness of the hour the sale was not completed and on Saturday, September 16th the residence, the lot between the store and the dwelling and the tinsmith tools and machinery will be offered for sale.

NERVY NAZIS NEED NICKING

While Hitler, the mad-man of Europe, who holds the whole world on the balance between peace and the horrors of war, and mankind in all parts of the earth near the desperation point in this terrible "war of nerves" about seven hundred German speaking people gathered in Vaughan Township just a few miles from Maple last Sunday and cheered the Nazi flag. Said to be members of some German bund they came from many parts of Ontario to hear speeches by their leaders urging them to be "true to the fatherland", sing German songs and even do a little drilling. The Swastika emblem was very prominently displayed. We are authoritatively informed that on this farm on the sixth concession of Vaughan similar gatherings have been held previously this summer and camps have been conducted there for German boys and girls where the "ideals of the fatherland" have been instilled into them.

Under present conditions we think such a gathering is taking Canadian tolerance a little bit too much for granted. If the ideals of the British Empire and Canada are not good enough for these people they should get back to the land of Hitler before they start "instilling the ideals of the fatherland". We all know what would happen if seven hundred Canadians held a similar meeting in Germany last Sunday. Since we haven't any concentration camps in Canada we would like to say to these Hitler sympathizers that the very best thing they can do is catch the first boat (if any more should go) back to Germany. And if they don't go of their own accord we would suggest that the authorities should see they are deported without delay.

York County doesn't want any bund demonstrations and those who encourage Nazi doctrines are not desirable citizens for Vaughan Township. Nervy Nazis should not take too much for granted. There is a limit to what even a most tolerant people will stand for.
