F. S. Tyndall Prize Winner Farm Contest

J. E. HADWEN, MAPLE, SECOND PRIZE WINNER

The results of the Farm Improvement Contest sponsored by the Richmond Hill Agricultural Society in conjunction with the Farmer's Magazine announced today by Mr. Paul E. Angle of Richmond Hill who acted as judge gave the major award of first prize to F. Stanley Tyndall of Vaughan, township. The contest which had nineteen entries in Markham and Vaughan townships was sponsored by the Agricultural Society with the aim of encouraging improvement of farms in the district. The contest was not to determine the best farm in the district, rather the prizes were for the farms which showed the most improvement during the season. Mr. Angle acting as sole judge visited the nineteen farms early in the summer and scored them according to the specified score card. A second visit was made last week and the farm scored on the same score card basis. The difference between the first and second score indicated the improvement accomplished.

Mr. Angle who judged the contest was generous in his praise of the efforts of farmers throughout the district who took part in the contest. "There has been real improvement made," he said in commending the aims of the Agricultural Society in sponsoring the competition.

F. S. Tyndall, the winner, had an increase of 22 in his score. On the first point "Removal of rubbish and clearing of unsightly spots in fence corners, yards, etc." he scored an improvement of 7 points. On repairing, painting and general improvement to buildings he scored 3 points, cleaning and whitewashing interior of stables and outbuildings 1 point and for repairs to or new gates and fences 4 points. For cutting of lawns, planting of trees, flowers, shrubs, etc. Mr. Tyndall scored an improvement of two points. For modern conveniences his original score was 5 and as none were added during the summer no improvement points were gained under this heading. Cutting weeds and brush netted one point improvement and four points were awarded for improvement in appearance bringing the improvement total up to 22.

J. E. Hadwen, lot 34, con. 4, Vaughan, was a very close second with 20 points and H. T. Jackson, lot 25, con. 4, Vaughan a close third with 19 points, Carl James, lot 9, con. 2 Markham fourth with 16 points and Wilfred G. Bowes, lot 11, con. 3 Vaughan fifth with 14 points.

Other competitors all of whom made a good showing were: Alfred Bagg, Edgeley; A. N. Bowes, Maple; W. T. Cook, Maple; R. G. Dobson, R.R. 2 Maple; H. J. Jarvis & Son, Unionville; J. S. McNair, Elgin Mills; O. D. Robinson, Todmorden; W. J. Robinson, R.R. 1 Richmond Hill; Frank P. Rumble, Maple; Dalton Rumney, Victoria Square; Archie Savage, Richmond Hill; J. S. Watson, Woodbridge; W. Wellman, Headford; R. L. Stiver, Unionville.

The contest is something new in farm competitions as the awards are for the improvement brought about in the year. It is noteworthy that fine farms such as those of Dalton Rumney, R. L. Stiver, Jarvis & Son, Frank P. Rumble and others all in excellent shape and very attractive farm homes would have difficulty in winning such a contest because they were in such fine condition to start with. Of the nineteen farms competing, Dalton Rumney's was scored the highest with 77 points out of a possible 100.

F. S. Tyndall, winner of the local contest is now eligible for the grand prize awards covering the whole of Ontario and conducted by the Farmer's Magazine.
