Ontario Potatoes of Better Quality Show great improvement over last year, states J. T. Cassin, potato expert, Ontario Dept. of Agriculture.

"The quality of the Ontario potato crop is much better than last counts and bills, B. Graham in the Liberal Classified Ads. bring quick year. Better seed has been used in all potato growing districts of the province, and growing conditions have been more favorable, particularly in the last two weeks," states J. T. Cassin, potato expert of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, who has just completed an extensive tour of provincial potato fields.

During June and July the moisture supply was not sufficient to produce a heavy crop of early potatoes. The old crop was completely cleaned up and there was a strong demand all This resulted in steady prices and there was no glut or surplus.

ate crop, now in the process of digging, will have a steady demand until last year, he states.

"A number of growers and farmshould. This, of course, resulted in poor and diseased crops. However, it taught them a lesson and this year," said Mr. Cassin, "they planted certified seed and as a result there is little disease."

He warned that there is a danger of late blight and advises that plants should be well-covered with Bordeaux mixture, especially in wet, rainy periods.
