NOTICE TO RATEPAYERS OF THE VILLAGE OF RICHMOND HILL

By-Law Number 470 duly passed
by the Council of the Village of
Richmond Hill and dealing with Con-
nection to Storm Sewers and the
Construction of Septic Tanks in the
Village enacts as follows:

THAT no person or persons whe-
ther land owners, tenants, or other-
wise, shall change, improve, repair,
widen, alter, divert or in any man-
ner deal with any drain, or water-
course which is now connected with
the storm sewers of the said Muni-
cipality without first advising the
Corporation of intention to do so
and furnishing particulars of the
proposed changes or alterations or
as the case may be, and obtaining
the approval of the Council of the
Corporation and a permit from the
Corporation signed by the Clerk,
permitting and approving of the
said changes or alterations.

AND IT is further enacted that
no person or persons shall hereafter
construct any septic tank, cellar,
sink, privy vault, privy, cesspool or
water closet without first submit-
ting a plan thereof with the manner
of draining to the Corporation and
obtaining the consent and approval
of the Corporation and a permit
signed by the Clerk thereof.

AND IT is further enacted that
the Corporation may make any regu-
lations for sewerage or drainage
in regard to any of the things or
matters mentioned or contained in
this By-law as it shall deem expedi-
ent for sanitary purposes and such
regulations when made may be ob-
tained from the Clerk of the Muni-
cipality. A fee of \$1.00 shall be
charged by the Clerk of the Muni-
cipality for issuing the Consent re-
quired by this By-law.

ANY person or persons who con-
travenes the requirements of this
By-law may be fined, under the Pro-
visions of The Summary Convictions
Act upon conviction, in the sum of
not less than \$1.00 nor more than
\$50.00.
