HORSE BREEDING IS ON INCREASE

Report of Stallion Enrolment Board mences Oct. 3, the province having mences Oct. 3 in five districts.

in Ontario, according to the report done at this time, the cost will be of the Stallion Enrolment Board, \$10 for a later inspection. just released by Secretary L. E. O'-Neill, Toronto. The report shows a total of 1,701 stallions for Ontario as compared with 1,583 last year.

Not since 1919, when 1,729 stallions were enrolled, has there been as many offered for service as in the past season, Mr. O'Neill states. The low point in horse breeding as indicated by enrolled stallions was in 1932, when the total reached but 1,013. Since then, each year has shown an increase.

It is interesting to note that Clydesdales and Percherons are exactly even this year, 660 stallions of each breed being enrolled. Last year there were 640 Percherons and 601 Clydes. These two breeds are followed in order by 166 Belgians, 111 Standard Breds, 33 Thoroughbreds, 18 French Canadians, seven French Coach, six German Coach, six Suffolk Punch and two miscell-

A survey of the leading counties is also interesting. Middlesex is first, with 99 stallion enrolled, followed by Perth and Huron, each

with 75; Bruce, 72; Simcoe, 71; Wellington and Grey, each 65; York, 62.
